"I went to the best schools in the country." Dan claims. And knowing it all, at the time any one could guess which school. This is when he says, "Yes I went to the Buddo schools for thirteen years." This was for both his primary

and secondary education levels.....amazing.

Buddo schools since time back has been known for its strong Christian influence on the teachers and the students, who in the end come out as winners in their lives and in the walk with Christ.

In addition to his true Buddonian spirit, strong personality, enthusiasm and devotion to Christ, Dan clarifies by saying "The Buddo culture and fellowship led me to Christ and I have never looked back since then and for this, I am forever grateful."

Professional Life

Think of diversity, today people toil from one area of life to next with many still joining new ventures either to discover themselves or for the utmost challenge of it or to meet their needs.

Well, Dan is so diverse in his life progress that he doesn't know which of his career missions stands off as more important.

He is a civil engineer by profession, currently into finance as the Chairperson of Y \$ave, he is a sports man with a strong passion for soccer and he is actively involved in the church activities and also as a choir member.

"I did sciences at HSC and this was because it was so prestigious then, but to look back at it, I would have loved sportsmanship because of the strong desire I have for soccer."

Upon finishing A' level, he joined Kyambogo University to pursue a degree in civil engineering after which he went straight into the job market and has since worked with National Housing until of recent when he left in February,09 to be involved full time in the financial sector of Y \$ave.

Why the Change?

Asked why he changed from engineering into finance, Dan smiles and you can surely notice his interest to talk about his life.

"In my life I have worked in only two places and that is the National Housing and Y \$ave." Dan says.

"It was five years into my work with the National Housing when ran into an old friend Denis Kiboneka at KPC under the Young Workers' Ministry of the church. With him, we then discussed finance, budgeting and savings. And being the big spender I was then, this was a true turning point in my life. It was like a wake up call.

With Dan Kisule, what stands out most is his life mission, "To glorify God in all that I do, especially what I have been called to do."


He also adds that, "I know that each of us was put here on earth for a purpose and each of us has a different purpose in life."

Enough is never enough. Hard work is the only thing that pays.

Having stopped his studies to leave for exile in 1980 in Sudan, he never did abandon his dream of becoming something in life. Though refugees were being taken into camps, he decided to try out life on his own without going to the camps. Yes this was tough but since God is the author of our life, all is left in His hands.

Luckily, he met a good Christian who took him and since they had no earnings, they fed on oats and powdered milk for breakfast, lunch and supper and this was provided by the mission.

Though the UNHRC were not willing to pay his fees as he wasn't in the camps, this did not deter his love for school and he decided to trek out and look for a job and to his luck. He one day walked into a compound where he met an Italian priest who did offer him a job at a printing press. Here, he worked for about a year and half and with the savings he joined school and started evening classes.

Christian in Business _____

Not like life has no challenges, this young man had to work from 7:00am to 4:00pm and then attend lessons till 8:00pm, after which he had to read his books. He was determined to succeed, but as fate would have it, one evening he got back home to find his books all burnt by a crazy friend and this was just two weeks to exam! With the Lord's guidance, he was allowed to attend the public school as the only boy since it was a girls' school. Amazingly, he passed his exams and got a certificate.

With this success, UNHRC offered to sponsor him to study a 3 year course in eyes (Optometry) in Khartoum which he gladly accepted and at the same time registered for the Cambridge O level exams; this was the beginning of his destiny.

After the completion of his studies and working for a period of time as an optician in Sudan, being a refugee, this young man accepted the offer by a charitable trust for a scholarship to further his studies at Master's level in the UK.

This is Anguyo J. Dralega, the optometrist and the Managing Director of Med – Optics Vision Centre in Kampala.

He is a very jolly person, so full of humour and very passionate about life and Christ.

The Christian Post interviewed him about his business and his walk with Jesus Christ today.

Tell us about your business.

Med-Optics Vision Centre has a cherished mission for the gift of sight. It was established with the view to providing high quality ophthalmic care through the qualified and experienced optometrist and to carry

out comprehensive eye examination and investigative optometry.

How did you get started in this business?

I was a practicing Optometrist in the UK for a number of years before deciding to return home and set up an optical practice that would raise the standard of eye care in Uganda. Med-Optics was started in 11th, April, 2002 and this is a coinciding date to our anniversary (Audrey my wife and I).

Our office was first situated in Buganda Road and then moved to Kampala Road in Mabirizi Complex.

Has this always been your dream profession?

I had always wanted be a doctor but God always has what is best in store for all of us.

From the moment I was sponsored to study eyes to this day, I know my calling was in the cherished gift of sight and I am so grateful since this is a very decent job.

What do you like about your work?

He gives reference to the Bible when Jesus healed a blind man. He paced his hands on his eyes and prayed then told him to go wash his eyes and he would see again.

I see myself as the waters where people come to wash their eyes and when they go out, they see again.

I like my work since it helps me give hope back to people; like students who cannot see to read, I help them to build their future by restoring their sight to enable them read their books. I extremely feel good to help people gain back their sight to appreciate the beauty of life again. Their faces light up and these are times when I give thanks to God and I am glad I did not become a doctor.

What has been the most challenging aspect in running this business as a Christian?

Financing is very expensive in the business sector. The cash flow is very stiff and banks do not trust anyone.

To give or get credit is very difficult since people do not honor their word. There is lack of trust and honesty in business dealings today and this is very challenging.

What has been your secret to success in business?

Being honest with clients. This is one business principle that can save one from far worse situations and double loss. When something is bad quality, admit it and when it is high quality with a high price, explain it to the client not to ruin your business.

When a situation occurs and it is your fault, admit it and make it right.

Is your family involved in this business?

Yes the family is involved in the business and Med–Optics has two Directors.

Mr. Anguyo Dralega as the Chairman and Mrs. Audrey Dralega as the Secretary.

We work with great motivation towards the success of the business.

How supportive has your family been to the business?

The family has been very supportive in this and without it Med-Optics would have been null and void.

The family financed the start of Med-Optics entirely from personal savings. Even the proceeds from the sale of our house in England was churned into the initial set up and those early running costs.

Tell us more about your family.

I am happily married to a lady I first saw in church while in exile in Sudan.

This lovely lady Audrey and I have been married for the last 17 years and together we have four beautiful children (two boys and two girls) Letaru 17years, Obaya 14years, Thandiwe 12years and Anguci of 6 years.

It is a very happy family and we do give thanks to God.

How do you juggle a busy schedule with your family life?

In the beginning, this was very difficult since the business was still very young and needed full attention and I could work from morning till late in the night.

However, with the growth of Med–Optics with its professional reliable employees, I can now take time with my family knowing everything is in good hands. I come in to look through and also to see some patients who insist on having me attend to them personally.

I also try to make sure I am home by 6:00pm to spend quality time with the kids, and we never forget prayers as a family on Sundays at church.

How do you practice the Christian faith as a business person?


Honesty. This is my most upheld virtue in my life. One cannot claim to be a true believer and not be honest. In my business I am honest and very straight forward with my clients.

He is a soft spoken fatherly figure who is in deep love with life and Christ. He emphasizes that Christ came to save the world and challenge our mindset. Daniel is also involved in a lot of Christian activities like the prayer meeting every Wednesday at the Nommo Gallery and he is founder of the International Bible Projects which was committed to researching and reporting situations of religious persecution. Asked what his contribution was in this regard, he answers without hesitation, "Sending Julia Semanbo (Justice Julia Sebutinde)

to Balgaria to challenge the authorities over the imprisonment of five Balgaria Pentecostals.

Dr. Kyanda takes pride in his profession as a teacher and he confesses that, "it has been very challenging over the years, but I have been very fortunate for having chosen this path." He is a trained teacher with his first experience being at Namutamba TTC during the time when Rev. Tom Nabeta was the principal. He later went on to Lubiri SS as the Deputy Headmaster and Head of Geography and then to Kings' College Buddo as the first African Head Master. He recently retired as the Director, Planning and Development, Ndejje University. He is now lead consultant and chief trainer with Alert Consulting and Training Services Ltd.

He believes in the potential of young people, and holds that education is essentially about what kinds of persons people become.

How they Met _____

Childhood Life

"My childhood was marked by very strict upbringing. My mother, who was naturally a teacher used the system of indirect rule and placed my elder brother Samuel in charge of discipline for his siblings. He was very strict and ensured discipline in the home. My father who was a saza/county chief Bugere Busiro Singo was quite busy and we did not have a very strong emotional relationship but it was basically formal."

Although he lacked emotional attachment with his father, Daniel says he enjoyed accompanying his father hunting for guinea fowls. "One day my father declined to have me go with him because of some misdeaminor the greatest punishment imaginable!"

Surprise knowing he is a teacher, Daniel says he hated Primary school at Namukozi, so much and together with one of his cousins they sometimes went into hiding so as not to attend school. Because of this they were always closely monitored by his parents a Saza constable was ordered to take Kyanda to school every day. He joined Buddo for both his primary and secondary studies and he has identified with the school throughout his studies. However, Daniel received Christ as a personal Savior in 1959 after leaving school. To him this was a clear sign and indication that a lot of seeds were sowed by his teachers.

He also acknowledges some of the fellow students who greatly challenged his life, Elieza Bawuba and Lino Avua. These were very humble, convinced and very Christian.

To his former teachers at Kings' College Buddo, Daniel Kyanda gives regards and respect. According to him, the most challenge was not the rules for the students to follow but lives lived consistently and put to productive work.

"I don't remember any teacher telling me to get saved but looking back at the environment, I believe Christian faith is the way of life." Daniel leads a life in faith and he shares with you his significant verse; Philippians: 4:8, "whatever things are true, whatever things are lovely, whatever things are of good report." This verse gives a vast arena for Christian thought life. Another verse that has meant so much to Daniel is where Paul says; he has learnt how to live in plenty and how to live in lack. In other words, the Christian cannot be intimidated by lack or intoxicated by plenty.



Marriage: Daniel and Victoria met in their early 60s and they were married in 1968 God blessed them with four (4) children.


Festo and Alyce Kyanda, North Carolina. They have 2 daughters and a son. Kezi Kyanda teaches English in Beijing, China

Now all her children are grown up and dispersed around the world. She stays in constant touch by phone and email, and regularly travels to spend time with them and the grandchildren in the UK and US where they are located.

After successfully raising the children, Lydia opened yet another chapter of her life, going back to school. She decided to go back to the University where she did her Bachelor's in Business Administration and even went a head to get a Master's in Business Administration. All this time her husband and children were great cheer leaders behind her efforts.

She later joined the work field; "I love my work so much, this has always been my dream" She says with a smile. Lydia is so engaged in people that Human Resource flows naturally in her vein.
